January Speaker

Celeste Fournier

For the Love of Honeybees: Apis Mellifera & Florida Beekeeping covers the history of the honeybee and beekeeping, the science of the honeybee and the hive, the products of the honeybee and the art of beekeeping. Celeste will touch on the requirements for keeping bees in Florida, and the current issues facing beekeepers.

She will also explore the benefits of the honeybee beyond pollination and honey production--from health and beauty products to medical treatments.

Celeste Fournier is the current Vice President of the Beekeepers Association of Southwest Florida. She has been a beekeeper for over two years, and is an Apprentice Master Beekeeper, working toward becoming an Advance Master Beekeeper through the University of Florida's Master Beekeeper Program. She and her family maintain 10-15 hives and sell the honey under the Bee Run Farms label. She has found bees to be unendingly fascinating and therapeutic.

When Celeste is not working her hives or doing honeybee outreach, she is a Planning Coordinator for Lee County Emergency Management, a position she has held since January 2007. Celeste holds a Bachelor of Arts in Public Relations from Quincy University.

Two great films to encourage the STEM potential in us all, are *Theory of Everything* and *Interstellar*! What great movies!

Last month I wrote about *Theory's* emotional and psychological sides. But I was motivated to read *Hawking's A Brief History of Time* and to see the 1991 film of the same name (which is more autobiographical than scientific but that's OK). It at least began my thinking about black holes and time, while Interstellar takes us there, through a black hole, defying time to save our species. One rating (over 350,000 voters) gave it 8.9 on a 10 point scale!

Interstellar, there is something for everybody: science fiction, action, philosophy, psychology, with beautiful special effects, music and great acting: Matthew McConaughey, Anne Hathaway, Jessica Chastain, Ellen Burstyn, John Lithgow, Michael Caine and Matt Damon! I can't say enough positive things about this film. The characters are likable and sympathetic, the problems interesting, the emotional tension well orchestrated, and the resolution deeply satisfying. Please see it.
