Our Speaker:

AH Muhammed



Abdul'haq Muhammed is the founder and Executive Director of Quality Life Center. He is a community leader and a motivational speaker with a vision for uplifting children and adults through confidencebuilding programs based on core values that will teach the tools of a rewarding life.

He is a native of Harlem, New York City. Muhammed served in the army and attended City College of New York and Fordham University. He co-founded the Woodycrest Center for Human Development in the Bronx and developed programs for youth and adults. Muhammed served as Director of Youth Programs and Board Chairman.

Muhammed has conducted sensitivity training for officers with the New York Police Department. He has spoken at many universities including Brown, Rutgers, Vassar, NYU, Columbia, City College and Hunter College, and was a frequent guest at the United Nations, meeting with ambassadors and heads of state. He became a Muslim and led a ministry. He trained chaplains to counsel inmates in penal institutions, including Riker's Island and Sing Sing.

With other concerned citizens, Muhammed founded Quality Life Center more than 25 years ago in order to meet the needs of underserved areas in southwest Florida in a way that is respectful and empowering. He developed programs to enhance character development, combat violence and drug abuse, reverse the "victim" mentality and tackle the negative self-image often found amongst the residents. Children in the program learn manners and selfrespect.

Muhammed is also a motivational speaker and a lecturer on Islam in America and the unity of faith. He has been involved with community organizations such as Lee County Alliance for the Arts, Lee County NAACP, The News-Press Editorial Board and Southwest Florida Workforce Development Board. He is a co-founder and former Chairman of the 21st Century Collaboration, a collection of community trustees, including faith-based leaders, who are united by the common purpose of developing solutions to community problems.

Muhammed has received many awards, including:

- 2010 Trailblazer Award from the News-Press
- 2012 Community Leader Award from the James Brunson Youth Development Foundation

- 2014 "Image Award" from the Lee County NAACP
- 2014 "Muslim of the Year" from the Council on American-Islamic Award

He gathered community leaders and people of influence to lead the movement to create a funding source for positive, proven youth programs. Gathering significant traction, Pennies for Community Progress - and Muhammed for spearheading the movement - was named a finalist of the "People to Watch" for 2016 by the News-Press.

Muhammed has a vision of equality, dignity and opportunity for all. Through his leadership and example, he has generated a sense of community and hope.

Be aware that Congress has recessed until after Labor Day, with no funding for Zika or gun control.

Indianapolis – Planned Parenthood of Indiana and Kentucky (PPINK) is consolidating four health centers and closing two health centers in Indiana over the next five months. These moves are part of a process to better serve the women and men of Indiana. Will this happen in Florida? Pay attention to the platforms of the RNC and DNC so we can hold their feet to the fire coming this fall. Sharing news from National AAUW to keep you up to date with this information. On May 16, 2016, the U.S. Supreme Court opted not to answer important legal questions in *Zubik v. Burwell*, a <u>critical case</u> dealing with <u>women's access to birth control</u>. AAUW is disappointed that women who work for religious nonprofits will <u>continue to lack clarity</u> on their access to contraception. No matter where women work or go to school, they deserve access to health care regardless of their employer's beliefs. The court opted to send this case and several related ones back to the lower courts. AAUW hopes that the lower courts will rule, as many already have, in favor of access to contraception as guaranteed by law.

AAUW joined coalition partners in a brief supporting contraceptive.

Tech Trek

DID YOU KNOW? AAUW National has done research which determined that encouraging girls at the rising eighth grade level to explore Science, Technology, Engineering and Math, (STEM) leads them to careers in these fields? This led AAUW CA to develop one week Science and Math camps for these age girls, and this year twenty-one such camps were conducted in ten states including Florida.

Tech Trek became a reality for <u>our</u> Branch this year. It all started last Fall when AAUW FL sent out Tech Trek information encouraging us to get involved. The process began with sending camp and scholarship information to middle school Science and Math teachers encouraging them to nominate the sharpest rising eighth grade girls in their classes. Thirteen girls were nominated. Eight completed applications and essays. A small group of our members reviewed each girl's submissions, interviewed the girl and a parent and ranked them using given criteria. Four of the eight were selected by Tech Trek FL and went off to the camp at Palm Beach State College in Boca Raton June 12-18. You will meet these four bright, talented and enthusiastic girls at the October luncheon.
