<u>Our Speaker - Naomi Bloom</u> <u>Bio:</u>

Recently retired after a half century career (with considerable regret and not a little apprehension about what comes next), Ms. Bloom was one of the most renowned consultants, influencers, and thought leaders in the enterprise technology industry. Ms. Bloom advised many large corporate clients on their HRM (Human Resource Management) and HR technology strategies and consulted with three generations of HRM software vendors and outsourcing providers on everything from business strategy to product/service

design. She acted as a strategic advisor and mentor to selected organizations and projects which advanced the state of enterprise class HR technology and its global adoption. Naomi built and maintained the only vendor-neutral HRM object model and implied application architecture "starter kit," which she licensed and consulted on across the industry. Her work made a significant contribution to many of today's best SaaS HRMS and talent management applications as well as to the expertise of today's best HRMS/TM product strategy and development teams. For her outstanding work and contributions to the industry, Ms. Bloom received IHRIM's Summit Award in 1995 and HRN's inaugural Lifetime Achievement Award. Ms. Bloom is well-published, including on her blog at www.InFullBloom.us, and is a much-sought-after speaker for her thought leadership, presentation effectiveness, clarity of vision, and humorous delivery. Naomi holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Pennsylvania and her MBA from Boston University where she is also a Fellow of the Human Resource Policy Institute at Boston University's Graduate School of Management.

Presentation Topic:

"My Half Century On The Road With Enterprise Software"

I was fortunate enough to get in on the ground floor of enterprise technology, starting my professional life in 1967 as a programmer trainee at John Hancock Life Insurance Company in Boston. But from there, I never could have imagined the direction of my career, let alone that I would retire, a half century later, after working with and (hopefully) impacting globally several generations of human resource (HR) executives, HR technology vendor executives, and HR software architects, designers and analysts. NEVER! But that's exactly what I did, and I learned a ton along the way, not only about myself and the industry I inhabited but also about how to build and sustain a very long career in a very young person's business. From her personal heroes and investments in lifelong learning to the network effect (it really does take a village) and overcoming the inevitable setbacks, I'd like to share the lessons I've learned about getting to the top and staying there, lessons that are applicable to any career or field of endeavor. And while not everyone may be as ambitious or driven as I have been and continue to be, albeit with now different goals in my sights, getting anything worthwhile accomplished really does benefit from what worked for me professionally. So please join me on a purposeful stroll through the last fifty years of one woman's professional history and what she's learned along the way.

A Senate bill that you might find interesting is S 286. It has been referred to the Senate Committee for Children, Families and Elder Affairs.

The human trafficking education portion of the health curriculum shall include, but is not limited to, information on the warning signs of human trafficking, terms used by traffickers, red flags that would indicate a trafficker's malicious intent toward a student, websites that are popular with traffickers, and details on how a student may get help. A student may elect to opt out of the instruction of this portion of the health education by providing the school with a written note from his or her parent.

Unfortunately, there is no change in status of equal pay bills, 410 and 319; they are still in committee referral as of March 10.

"Committees do the bulk of the legislative debate, modification. They are specialized by areas of oversight or expertise and will discuss and research the bill, potentially amending or substituting a new draft. The committee recommends to the entire chamber that the bill Pass or do not pass." April 25 is the last day for regularly scheduled committee meetings.
