How a Bill Becomes A Law

The Florida session of the State Legislature began January 8 and ends March 7. Fifty bills had been introduced and assigned to committee at the close of 2017. Either house may originate legislation. There are 40 Senators and 120 Representative. Each house member gets six bill slots; there is no limit for Senators.

Each committee studies the bill and decides if it should pass, fail, or be amended.

Once a bill has passed through committee, it will go to the full chamber to accept the bill as is, change it, or reject it. Once passed, the bill goes to the other chamber for review.

When both chambers pass a bill, it is sent to the governor. He can sign the bill into law, allow it to pass into law without his signature or reject it.

The only requirement of the session is to pass a budget. This is an election year and legislators are focused on that.

61st Annual Thomas Alva Edison Science and Engineering Fair

The Thomas Alva Edison Science and Engineering Fair showcases Science and Engineering Projects that are presented by 450 students from Lee and Charlotte Counties.

For the past six years, AAUW has been a part of the Special Awards Category. The Fort Myers/Lee County Branch gives out two "Women in STEM" awards. Each of these awards is one of the largest awards given in this category. The awards are given to two female Lee County high school students. The first award, one hundred dollars, is presented to a young lady who has never previously competed in the regional fair. The project also needed to show an interest in one or more of the STEM fields. The second award is for five hundred dollars and is given to a young lady whose project shows the potential to benefit our community and or our environment. The selected projects also must be independent research done by


the student and not under the direct supervision of a higher learning or research center.

This year's one-hundred-dollar award has been given to the team of Joanna Prado-Pena and Nayely Botello. The team looked at alternative milks for the making of cheesecakes. They looked at the type of milk and how it affected the rising and cracking of cheesecakes to determine which milk: soy, almond or coconut could be used as a healthy alternative to whole milk. Joanna and Nayela are sophomores at Dunbar High School

Lauren Bierbaum is the recipient of the five – hundred dollar award. She is a freshman at Evangelical Christian School. Lauren's project, "Sometimes Quitters Do Win," showed the effect of cigarette smoking and vaping on the lungs (pig). She hopes to continue the project to bring to light the health hazards of both smoking and vaping.
