### Speaker for May 60 YEARS OF SPACE EXPLORATION A Talk by Chuck Fuechsel

The talk begins with early flight experiments by Dr. Robert Goddard in the early 20th century, and reviews several events up to the launch of the first artificial Earth satellite, Sputnik, by the Soviet Union. Soon after, (NASA), the National Aeronautics and Space Administration was created and a golden era of space exploration and technology development began.



This has bought a much deeper understanding to mankind of the vastness of the universe and our place within it, and a host of applications including weather forecasting, telecommunications, and satellite navigation (GPS) that the citizens of the world now depend upon.

**Biographical Information:** Charles F. Fuechsel

(Mr. Fuechsel has served as an engineer, project manager and senior executive with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. He graduated from the University of Virginia Engineering School in 1961 and earned a Master of Science degree at the George Washington University in Washington, DC. He served as the project manager responsible for developing the Hubble Space Telescope flight operations systems and facilities. He was later appointed Director of the Communications and Data

Systems Division at NASA Headquarters with responsibility for NASA's worldwide telecommunications networks and the operations control facilities for many of NASA's scientific satellites.

(Since retiring from NASA, he has served as a consultant advising ongoing NASA Project Managers. He and his wife, Carol reside in Fort Myers, Florida. Mr. Fuechsel serves as a Director of the Scientists' Society of Southwest Florida and enjoys serving as a judge for local school science fairs and meeting young students and encouraging them to pursue careers in the sciences. The level of motivation and achievement of many of these students is inspiring, and it is a privilege to have the opportunity to meet and interact with them.)

# **Marie Glasgow and AAUW Friends FUND**

In January Ron Glasgow began the new Marie Glasgow and AAUW Friends Fund with two purposes in mind. He wanted to memorialize his wife Marie Glasgow (pictured at left), our president from 2013-2015. Marie believed passionately in the importance of education and worked tirelessly for decades to improve the opportunities for women and

girls. Ron also wanted to honor AAUW Fort Myers/Lee County for their more than fifty years of efforts to improve the educational opportunities for women in Lee County while providing a stimulating community for women of like minds.

After several months researching possibilities, Ron and our Scholarship Chairs, Janet George and Bonnie Ryan have determined that The Foundation for Lee County Public Schools will manage the FUND. Each year the FUND will award \$500 to a Middle School student in the Lee County System.

On even years, the award will be made based upon a student's project at the **Thomas Alva Edison-Kiwanis Regional Science Fair.** The project should reflect a basic understanding of the principles of science, technology, engineering or mathematics and demonstrate the potential for further study. On odd years, the award will be made for a student's project at the **Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventor's Fair.** The project should reflect a basic understanding of what to do with an idea: what steps to take to develop it, protect it, pay for it, and eventually share and profit from it. The award will either go for a STEM related educational activity or will be held for the student until she is accepted into college.

#### **Woman Of Interest**

Katherine G. Johnson

A physicist and mathematician, Katherine G. Johnson worked with NASA in calculating trajectories, launch windows and the return paths for many famous space flights. Her background includes such projects as Project Mercury (the first man to fly into space), 1969's Apollo 11 (first flight to the Moon) and the Space Shuttle program

At the time of her work, African-Americans and women were not respected in the workplace. In 1953, she was hired by NASA and struggled to receive equal recognition for her work. During her time at NASA, she worked under segregated conditions as a "computer."

Still alive at age 98, Johnson lives in Virginia, where the movie, *Hidden Figures*, takes place. She saw the movie and enjoyed it..."It was well done..." she said according
