Our January Speaker is Arthur L. "Gene" Dole, Vice President, Charlotte Harbor Anthropological Society.

Afar In Ethiopia. Findings from this archaeological expedition. Paleoanthropological Research at Gona, Afar, Ethiopia Findings from paleoanthropological research at Gona, Afar, include those from the Hadar site, one of the world's richest sources of information on the physiology and habitats of human evolution, which include partial skeletons of Australopithecus afarensis, a key species in our evolution. Major paleontological work began at Hadar in the early 1970s and was led by the American anthropologist, Donald Johanson. His team discovered a 40-percent-complete female skeleton of A. afarensis that became popularly known as Lucy. Located in the Afar triangle of the African Rift Valley, Gona has yielded the world's oldest archaeological sites, with very early stone tools dated to between 2.5 and 2.6 million years ago.

The site has also yielded the earliest known remains of the human genus, Homo, which date to 2.3 million years ago, along with some of the earliest known evidence of tool use. Located at the juncture of the Arabian, Somali, and African tectonic plates, the Eastern Rift Valley has experienced significant geologic upheaval. Over several million years, numerous volcanic eruptions laid down layers of volcanic ash at Hadar, effectively covering fossil remains with a succession of strata



that have been systematically identified and dated by researchers. Seismic activity combined with heavy erosion has gradually exposed the region's fossil record, greatly reducing the amount of excavation required for locating hominid remains. These conditions make Hadar one of the world's richest sources of information on the physiology and habitats of hominid species.

Woman of Interest

Gabrielle Dee Giffords (born June 8, 1970) is an politician from Arizona and American As a Democratic member control advocate. the United States House of Representatives, she represented Arizona's 8th congressional district from January 3, 2007, until her resignation on January 25, 2012, after surviving an assassination attempt that left her with a severe brain injury. In January 2013, Giffords and her husband Mark Kelly started a political action committee called Americans for Responsible Solutions whose mission is to promote gun-control legislation with elected officials and the general public. The couple supports "keeping guns out of the hands of dangerous people like criminals, terrorists, and the mentally ill". [112]

Other proposals from Giffords and Kelly include limiting the sale of certain magazines, limiting the sale of assault weapons, and stopping gun trafficking.

Giffords was a surprise witness at a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing on gun violence on January 30,



2013. [113] In a halting voice, she called for Congress to pass tougher laws on guns, saying "too many children are dying." Giffords is right-handed; her speech therapist had to write out her statement for her since her right arm was paralyzed in the shooting.
