


"TAMING HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOMS IN LAKES AND COASTAL WATERS IN SOUTH FLORIDA,"

is the topic of our featured speaker, **Dr. William J. Mitsch** for our February 20 monthly meeting.



For over 44 years, he has been a university professor specializing in wetland biogeochemistry and ecological engineering. His resume is twelve pages in length, organized by country. That's how widespread his expertise and service have been. These days, Dr. Mitsch is the Director of the Everglades Wetland Research Park at Florida Gulf Coast University in Naples. He is a professor of Marine Biology and Ecological Science, holding the Juliet C. Sproul Chair for SW Florida Habitat Restoration and Management at FGCU.

Among his many awards and honors is the Stockholm Water Prize, presented by H.M.King Carl XVI Gustaf in 2004. This award is commonly referred to as the "Nobel Prize in Water."

Dr. Mitsch holds M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Florida and a B.S. from Notre Dame.

He has authored over seven hundred publications and edited five editions of the standard textbook *Wetlands*.

Florida and our AAUW branch are very lucky to have Dr. Mitsch with us. If anyone can help us understand the problems with our waterways, he's the one. His talk. "Taming Harmful Algal Blooms in Lakes and Coastal Waters in South Florida," will be followed by a brief Q & A session on Zoom.

As of January 29, eleven of our members (Naomi Bloom, Tamara Pigott, Devera Graf, Janet George, Judith Sims, Cheryl Tromley, Lynn Felice, Mary Kellner, Judith Clare, Robin Tuthill, Carolyn Nance) have donated a total of \$3,200. THANK YOU for helping us help girls and women achieve their potential!!

If you have not had the opportunity to donate, it is not too late. Currently, this is our only fund-raising mechanism, so we still *REALLY* need your contributions to make it possible for us to offer our scholarships. We remain committed to our primary focus "empowering women and girls" through our scholarships. We are hopeful that, with your help, we will be able to award all of our scholarships this year.

Our *AAUW Star Bright Scholarship* winner for 2020/2021 is Jasmine McDow who is pursuing her LPN at Fort Myers Technical College. Congratulations Jasmine! This scholarship was established in 2005, by Book Club 3, to provide branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College.

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need and few other scholarships, chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Award: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards one \$500 prize to a top female entrant in the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. A "First Time" award of \$100 is also given to a female entrant for an outstanding first entry. All Lee County female high school entrants in the Edison Regional Science Fair are eligible.

Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS): This hands-on program for middle school girls. It is dedicated to science education. It is led by enthusiastic professionals and undergraduates who serve as facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student age 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority us given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.

One of the founders was Ellen H. Swallow Richards who is one of America's first female professional chemists and the first woman to be accepted by a scientific school,

Richards is best known for pioneering the field of sanitary engineering. Richards performed an unprecedented survey in 1890 that led to the first state water-quality standards in the nation.

President's Message

February is Black History Month, an annual observance to celebrate and honor the accomplishments of Black Americans throughout our history. In 1926, historian Carter G. Woodson, who authored the "Journal of Negro History," first chose the second week in February which coincided with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln on February 12 and Frederick Douglass on February 14. Decades later, in 1969, black educators and students at Kent State University first proposed February to be Black History Month.

On January 20, 2021 at the 46th Presidential Inauguration, Amanda Gorman recited her poem titled, "The Hill We Climb." What an incredible brilliant recitation, she skillfully delivered. Amanda is a young black woman and recent graduate of Harvard. In 2017 she became the first person ever to be named National Youth Poet Laureate in the U.S. As I witnessed Amanda recite her poem, I had thoughts of Maya Angelou when she stood at the podium in 1993 to recite, "On The Pulse of Morning," at the 42nd Presidential Inauguration. Maya Angelou was the first black and the first woman poet to recite at a presidential inauguration. At age 22, Amanda became the youngest.

AAUW's mission remains bold as we celebrate 140 years of advancing gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy. The pandemic has disproportionally impacted women. It is estimated that over 2.2, million women have left the workforce. More and more families are facing serious economic insecurity. "AAUW has pledged to work with the new administration and the 117th Congress to make equity a top priority in 2021." _AAUW Action Newsletter

Mary Cassatt



Children at the Beach By Mary Cassatt

Part of the Impressionist movement in art, Mary Cassatt exhibited her paintings with such artists as Monet, Pissarro, and her close friend Degas, and shared with them an independent spirit, refusing throughout her life to be associated with any art academy or to accept any prizes.

Cassatt's art portrays the activities of women in their worlds: caring for children, reading, crocheting, pouring tea, and enjoying the company of other women. Cassatt was the first American artist to exhibit with the French impressionists in Paris. She first traveled to Europe with her family when she was eleven, and by the age of sixteen had decided to be a professional artist.



Mary Cassatt lived in Paris for most of her life, however she herself an American and was proud of her Philadelphia roots.

Here is a recipe submitted for the cookbook:

Kringle Coffee Danish or Dessert

This recipe originated in Racine, Wisconsin, a city which was settled by people from Denmark. They have a special Danish coffee cake called a Kringle. "Kringle" is the Danish word for pretzel.

Kringle - Part 1

1 cup flour 3+ Tbs.milk; 1/4 lb oleo or butter Chopped pecans

- 1. Mix flour and butter (like pie crust that's crumbly; add milk; just enough to form a ball)
- 2. Spread in two parts on cookie sheet (about 4 in. thick.)
- 3. Or use large round tin, at least 10 inches in diameter.
- 4. Sprinkle chopped pecans on top

Other options: Instead of the nuts, spread with jelly, preserves, prepared pie filling or cinnamon and raisins.

Kringle - Part 2

1/4 lb oleo or butter 1 cup flour 1 cup water 3 eggs,

1 Tbs. vanilla extract

- 1. Melt above over heat. Remove from heat; add flour and vanilla.
- 2. 3 eggs, one at a time beating well with electric beater;
- 3. Spoon over Part 1 so edges meet but do not overlap.
- 4. Bake at 425 degrees for 25-30 minutes, until golden brown. Cool before serving
- 5. Best to use a pie-drip saver pan to give it more of a "kringle" look, pictured below.



Frosting (Can be frosted with powdered sugar frosting when cool)

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- 1-2 tablespoons milk
- 1. In medium bowl, mix powdered sugar and butter with spoon or electric mixer on low speed. Stir in vanilla and 1 tablespoon of the milk.
- 2. Gradually beat in just enough remaining milk to make frosting smooth and spreadable. If frosting is too thick, beat in more milk, a few drops at a time.
