WELCOME, Kaley Dietrich



Our September meeting was held via Zoom. We surveyed your thoughts on meeting in person, in small groups, and our future meetings.



 - 4 in early 2022
 - Note: There were no responses for December and "I do not plan to return"


At this time, are you comfortable resuming in-person, indoor chapter meetings in October as originally planned?

42 responses




- Half of the respondents were not comfortable resuming in-person, in-door chapter meetings
- However, one in three is comfortable resuming in October as originally planned
- Several additional people indicated they would be more comfortable if people were vaccinated and/or there were distancing protocols


Which of the following, if any, would make you more comfortable attending in-person, indoor chapter meetings?



- 35 respondents indicated they would be more comfortable if all participants were fully vaccinated
- 34 would be more comfortable if people were masked
- 29 would be more comfortable if all social distancing guidelines are followed
- 4 would be more comfortable if masks were not required



- Most respondents were comfortable with small group meetings held outdoors (88.4%)
- 2 indicated no interest in outdoor meetings
- 2 indicated they may be comfortable with this type of arrangement, one with a caveat about seating and shade
- 1 wanted all participants at the small group outdoor meeting to be vaccinated and masked
- In terms of continuing to hold chapter meetings via Zoom
- While the majority (57.5%) of respondents prefer this approach, more than one-third are not
- One indicated to continue with Zoom for the Fall
- One indicated their response depended on the safety protocols



• 100% of respondents indicate they are vaccinated

Additional Comments

- Several indicated that while they felt it was best to continue on Zoom at this time, they do hope to get back to in-person meetings in the New Year.
- A few mentioned Zoom fatigue and said they miss the more personal connections gained meeting face-to-face
- One person expressed dissatisfaction with the survey being a Google tool due privacy concerns
- One person said that it was a matter of personal responsibility and if people don't feel safe, they shouldn't attend in person meetings

FOCUS ON OUR SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship Committee: Cheryl Tromley,
Devera Graf, Marcia Howard

AAUW Star Bright Scholarship: This scholarship was established in 2005, by Book Club 3, to provide branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College.

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship: : Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a two-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need and few other scholarships chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Award: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards one \$500 prize to a top female entrant in the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. A "First Time" award of \$100 is also given to a female entrant for an outstanding first entry. All Lee County female high school entrants in the Edison Regional Science Fair are eligible.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW STEM Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, past president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co Branch. It is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair.

Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS): This hands-on program is dedicated to science education for regional middle school girls by enthusiastic professionals and undergraduates as facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student aged 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority us given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.

PUBLIC POLICY

An important part of AAUW's mission is to inform members of public policy issues, debates, and decisions that affect the lives of women throughout the lifespan and to actively engage with legislators to provide information as issues arise. The following statement taken directly from the AAUW national website explains AAUW's philosophy of advocacy succinctly:

"Though we are nonpartisan, we are not values-neutral: We fight to remove the barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles. And we advocate for federal, state and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination."

The following is a statement from Kate Nielson, AAUW's Senior Director of Public Policy, Legal Advocacy, & Research:

On September 14, 2021, the U.S. Census Bureau and Bureau of Labor Statistics released data indicating that, in 2020, women were paid 83 cents for every dollar paid to a man. While the numbers show that the gender pay gap closed slightly amidst the chaos of COVID-19, this data point is highly misleading. The unfortunate story behind the statistic is that the pandemic has been devastating for women and their families, reversing the progress women have made in recent decades.

Millions of women lost their jobs during the first year of the pandemic and remained out of work for a long time. Additionally, countless more women left the workforce completely to deal with childcare, homeschooling and other domestic responsibilities. These women are absent completely from the calculation on which today's pay gap figure is based. Couple that with the fact that women make up the majority of the low-wage workforce, which experienced especially devastating cuts over the past 18 months, and it contributes to the appearance that women's wages actually rose in comparison to men's wages.

Since this new data looks only at full-time, year-round workers, however, it does not fully capture what happened to women's wages in 2020. So, we cannot adequately compare this year's data to that of previous years and cannot fully assess the impact of the massive job losses on the gender pay gap. But make no mistake, women are decidedly *not* better off now than they were in 2019. And if anything, this tells us that we need to ensure more women have pathways to good jobs, with good pay and good benefits.

Over the past 18 months, many workers, especially women, have struggled because of inadequate paid leave and/or affordable quality childcare. This new data notwithstanding, the bottom line is that the COVID-19 crisis has exacerbated the economic gender divide. As we begin to rebuild from the health and economic crises, it is imperative that we put women at the center of our recovery efforts and seize the moment to correct the inequities that persist in our labor force. Now is the moment to reconfigure our national priorities and build a society where women—and the families who depend on them—get the economic security they rightly deserve.

Eleanor Roosevelt

Anna Eleanor Roosevelt (October 11, 1884 –November 7, 1962) was an American political figure, diplomat and activist. She served as The First Lady of the United States from 1933 to 1945, during her husband President Franklin D. Roosevelt's four terms in office, making her the longest-serving first lady of the United States.

Roosevelt served as United States Delegate to the United Nations General Assembly from 1945 to 1952. She urged the United States to join and support the United Nations and became its first delegate.

Roosevelt also served as the first chair of the UN Commission on Human Rights and oversaw the drafting of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
