Dr. Annemarie Connor Our November 20th Speaker



Annemarie Connor, PhD, OTR/L, Assistant Professor of Occupational Therapy in the Department of Rehabilitation Sciences, and Director of the Community Autism Network (CAN) at Florida Gulf Coast University.

After 15 years of clinical experience as an occupational therapist (OT), Dr. Connor transitioned to academia to research the needs of an underserved segment of the disability community, adolescents and young adults with autism and related neurodevelopmental disorders.

Dr. Connor's research agenda focused on the complex needs of the autism community, namely: early identification, biological causes, and potential cures. Her Occupational Therapy clinical background and PhD in Rehabilitation Counseling, which honed her research skills, have made her a premiere expert on the autistic individual and his or her underserved family and community.

She has published numerous journal articles and is the principal investigator of multiple community-based participatory research projects. In addition to her work with CAN, Dr. Connor's service commitments include co-chairing the Florida Occupational Therapy Association Research Special Interest Section; the Promising Pathways Autism Conference, non-profit Board work; and reviewing for the *Journal of Autism and Developmental Disorders*.

As an educator training the next generation of practitioners, Dr. Connor focuses on the translation of research to practice, and the development of her students' professional identity and their therapeutic affect through explicit use of teacher-student working alliances.







Directions to Picnic Point in The Landings



Enter at the Gate House. Turn left at the STOP sign onto South Landings Drive. At the three-way-STOP, turn right onto Flagship Drive. At the next STOP sign, turn left onto South Landings Drive (this road circles around the area). Continue until you reach the Yacht Harbor. Turn right onto the road that borders the harbor on the north. Find a place to park and continue walking on the path to Picnic Point on south (left.) Our Scholarships:

AAUW Star Bright Scholarship: This scholarship was established in 2005, by Book Club 3, to provide branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College.

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need and few other

scholarships chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Award: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards one \$500 prize to a top female entrant in the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. A "First Time" award of \$100 is also given to a female entrant for an outstanding first entry. All Lee County female high school entrants in the Edison Regional Science Fair are eligible.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW STEM Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co Branch for two years. It is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair.

Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS): This hands-on program is dedicated to science education for regional middle school girls by enthusiastic professionals and undergraduates as facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000

scholarship to a Lee County female student, ages 25 or older with demonstrated financial need, who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority us given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.

PUBLIC POLICY

An important part of AAUW's mission is to inform members of public policy issues, debates, and decisions that affect the lives of women throughout the lifespan and to actively engage with legislators to provide information as issues arise. The following statement taken directly from the AAUW national website explains AAUW's philosophy of advocacy succinctly:

"Though we are nonpartisan, we are not values-neutral: We fight to remove the barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles. And we advocate for federal, state and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination."

The AAUW-FL Public Policy Committee met October 21 to begin plans for the 2022 Florida Legislative Session. A major change of note is that the 2022 session will begin January 11, rather than in March as has been customary. As a result, AAUW Lobby Days have been scheduled for January 18 and 19, much earlier than usual. Legislators must submit bills for consideration by January 11. As that happens, the Public Policy Committee is reviewing them to see which bills directly affect our mission. Once the PPC reviews the bills and identifies a manageable number that most directly affect our mission (either to support or to oppose), the bills are submitted to National for review and approval. When our slate is finalized, it will be shared with members for their action. As Florida finalizes plans for Lobby Days, information will be shared with members. There is a very tight timeline this year. Every effort will be made to share information in a timely manner.

WOMEN OF INTEREST

MARION TALBOT

AAUW was founded by Marion Talbot, who became the Dean of the College of Women at the University of Chicago In 1882. While still a student, she co-founded the American Association of University Women with her mentor Ellen Swallow Richards. During her long career at the University of Chicago, Talbot fought tenaciously and often successfully to improve support for women students and faculty, and against efforts to restrict equal access to educational opportunities.

ELLEN SWALLOW RICHARDS

Ellen Henrietta Swallow Richards was an industrial and safety engineer, environmental chemist, and university faculty member at MIT during the 19th century. Her pioneering work in sanitary engineering, and experimental research in domestic science, laid a foundation for the new science of home economics. She was the founder of the home economics movement characterized by the application of science to the home, and the first to apply chemistry to the study of nutrition.
