STEM and **STEAM**:



Inclusive STEM Education: Inviting More Voices to Address SWFL's Most Critical Issues



Dr. Heather Skaza Acosta

The Whitaker Center at Florida Gulf Coast University works with FGCU faculty and students, the K-12 community, and public stakeholders to broaden participation and develop workforce capacity in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) disciplines. The Center integrates expertise across campus and the community to develop solutions to our region's most pressing issues.

Dr. Heather Skaza Acosta will discuss how various frameworks in STEM, like place-based education, models and modeling, STEAM, and environmental justice help more learners find a seat at the STEM table. We will discuss why inclusive STEM participation advances the field and provides a stronger foundation for equitable problem-solving. Broadening participation in a historically white male-dominated field will benefit "good science" and our community.

Dr. Skaza Acosta's undergraduate work was completed at the Ohio State University in Environmental Biology. Her graduate work in Environmental Education was completed at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, before moving to Southwest Florida in 2016. She specialized in using models and modeling to teach about the local impacts of climate change in our region. She has served as the Director of Education at the Conservancy of Southwest Florida and is the Committee Chair for the Environmental Education Alliance of Southwest Florida, in addition to her work at FGCU. She lives in Fort Myers with her husband and two wild boys.

As you may know, our Branch as well as AAUW National, has for years been promoting STEM as part of our goal of empowering girls and women to succeed in college, through our involvement in scholarships and the GEM program for middle school age girls.

Women of Interest




The women in "Hidden Figures" and their movie counterparts. The book highlights the experiences of three specific black women: Katherine Johnson, Dorothy Vaughan, and Mary Jackson, and the movie brought their stories to an even larger audience.

What's the History of Women in STEAM?

In 1946, women coders helped make the first computer work. But their work on ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Computer) wasn't recognized at the time. And people who later saw the coders in photographs published with articles about ENIAC thought the women were just models."

In the 1940s, the aeronautics predecessor to NASA hired a group of Black women who later used their math, coding, and engineering skills to help give the space agency the ability to have a huge impact on the world. These women were unsung heroes until a 2016 book, "Hidden Figures" and a 2017 movie of the same name brought their stories to public attention.

Strategic Planning Committee

A short history of this committee: several years ago, National put out a Strategic Plan to assist branches with achieving the AAUW mission of advancing gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy. National had three areas of focus:

- 1. Education and Training (addressing barriers in education)
- 2. Economic Security (ensuring livelihoods for women)
- 3. Leadership (increasing the number of women in leadership roles)

In September 2021 AAUW Florida adopted a Strategic Plan to assist Florida branches with achieving National's goals. In October 2021 our branch formed an Ad Hoc Strategic Planning Committee to develop a 2-year strategic plan specific to our branch, incorporating National and Florida AAUW goals. The committee was made up of multiple Board members and met over several months. The following recommendations were made and approved by the Board in April 2022:

- 1. Appoint a Diversity Officer
- 2. Expand STEM to included STEAM scholarships
- 3. Create an Editorial Committee to schedule activities/messaging reflecting a specified AAUW theme
- 4. Collaborate with other Florida branches
- 5. Increase branch membership, including mentors to new members to increase retention and participation
- 6. Designate the Strategic Planning Committee as a Standing Committee, reporting to the Board quarterly

It was such fun to be able to kick off a new season by meeting in person!!

As I said at the meeting and in the last Torch, we are (mostly) in good financial shape and will be able to offer all our scholarships with a minimum of begging for funds. I know you must be tired of reading this column only to be continually asked to contribute yet again. We really do wish we didn't have to continue to do so—especially after your incredible generosity during COVID.

One small request....

The AAUW Star Bright Memorial Scholarship was established in 2005 by Book Club 3. It provides branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College.

While all our scholarships are meaningful, the Star Bright scholarship is especially impactful because of the women it targets. These women, often minorities, are attending technical colleges and are working incredibly hard to improve their lives against the odds. Their stories are truly inspiring. We have been able to award this scholarship every year since it was established, but this year is uncertain. Unlike our other scholarships, the Star Bright Memorial Scholarship is funded directly by member contributions rather than through our normal, budgeted fundraising channels. We currently have only \$235.00 in the fund. While it was designed as a commemorative scholarship, I hope I can persuade you that making sure we can award the scholarship this year is important even if you have nothing new to commemorate or honor. As you decide on your end-of-year giving, please think about adding to the fund. We will keep you up to date on our progress.



Our Scholarships

AAUW Star Bright Scholarship
(See description in the box)

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Award: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards one \$500 prize to a top female entrant in the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. A "First Time" award of \$100 is also given to a female entrant for an outstanding first entry. All Lee County female high school entrants in the Edison Regional Science Fair are eligible.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW STEM Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co Branch for two years. It is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair.

Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS): This hands-on program is dedicated to science education for regional middle enthusiastic school girls by professionals and undergraduates facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student aged 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.
