Our Luncheon Speaker:

Dr. Russell Sabella, Expert in Cyber-Bullying and School Counseling October 21 Meeting

The title of his presentation is Five Approaches To Enhancing Cyber Safety. Dr. Sabella explains cyberbullying involves information and communication technologies to support deliberate, repeated, and hostile behavior by an individual or group intending to harm others. The technology used includes e-mail, message boards, blogs, instant messaging, cell phone, text messaging, defamatory personal websites and/or online personal polling sites. This presentation outlines a comprehensive approach to help you understand the nature of cyberbullying while at the same time providing helpful tips for risk reduction and intervention among bullies, victims, and bystanders. For example, parents can set up a Google-Alert, put their child's name, email address, screen names, etc., and when any negative content shows up the parents will get an email.

Dr. Russell A. Sabella is currently a Professor in the College of Education, Florida Gulf Coast University. He is co-author of these four books: School Counselor Side Hustle (Sabella & Associates); Stress Management (Faulkner Press, 2017); Confronting Sexual Harassment: Learning Activities for Teens (Educational Media; 1995); and Counseling in the 21st Century: Using Technology to Improve Practice (American Counseling Association; 2004).

He also authored Solution-Focused School Counseling: The Missing Manual (2020); School Counselor.com: A Friendly and Practical Guide to the World Wide Web (2nd edition; 2003); GuardingKids.com: A Practical Guide to Keeping Kids Out of High-Tech Trouble (2008.)

He is well-known for his Technology Boot Camp for Counselor workshops conducted throughout the country. Dr. Sabella is past President of the American School Counselor Association (2003-2004), and the Florida School Counselor Association (2013-2014). He has trained and consulted with tens of thousands of school counselors, educators, parents, and organizational leaders throughout the country.

Woman of Interest

Dorothy Casterline as a young researcher at Gallaudet University (which is the university for the deaf) in the early 1960s helped write the first comprehensive dictionary of American Sign Language, a book that revolutionized the study of deaf culture.

As an undergraduate English major at Gallaudet, in Washington, in the late 1950s, Mrs. Casterline, who had lost her hearing at 13, caught the attention of a Professor William Stokoe. In addition to teaching literature, Dr. Stokoe was investigating the grammar and syntax of sign language, which at the time was considered nothing more than a gestural derivative of spoken English.

Dr. Stokoe believed that there was much more to it. His goal, which he realized in 1965 with Mrs. Casterline and Professor Carl Croneberg, as co-authors, was to compile the first systematic dictionary of what they came to call American Sign Language.

Mail-In Ballots DID YOU KNOW?

All mail-in ballot requests expired at the end of 2022. This has nothing to do with your voter registration. If you were registered to vote in FL/Lee County prior to 12/31/22, you are still registered to vote. However, you must reapply for mail-in ballots.

This is easy to do at https://www.lee.vote (If you do not live in Lee County, go to the appropriate website.) Scroll down the home page to find the link to accomplish this. If your address has changed, you must correct that with the election's office. Mail-in ballots cannot be forwarded.

The new requests will expire at the end of 2024.

GREAT DECISIONS

Great Decisions is America's largest discussion program on world affairs. The program model involves reading the Great Decisions *Briefing Book*, watching the documentary film series and meeting in a Discussion Group to discuss the most critical global issues facing America today. The 2024 Great Decisions discussion year will begin in February, 2024. Great Decisions meets virtually on the first Friday of every month (usually with a couple of alterations due to holidays) from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. There are eight topics each year; our branch meets February through June and September through November. Participants purchase a booklet published by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA) to prepare for the discussions and watch a "Master Class" video on the topic. FPA suggests additional readings for each topic, but that reading is at the discretion of the individual participant. Group members take turns facilitating the discussions. Costs for the booklet and shipping/handling have not yet been announced. However, in previous years the cost of the booklet has been \$35, with a 20 percent discount if ordered by late October. Here is a summary of the 2024 topics:

Mideast Realignment U.S. involvement in Middle East affairs is at a much lower level than at the height of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Should this be the continued policy, or should the U.S. recommit to more of a leading role in the region?

Climate Technology and Competition How can the world's major powers cooperate on global climate initiatives and encourage developing economies to work with them?

Science Across Borders All the world benefits when global powers share scientific advances. But what about when an advancement, such as AI, has the potential to threaten national security?

U.S.-China Trade Rivalry After decades of U.S. business activity in China, accompanied by frequent claims of China's predatory policies, should China be denied access to our research and technology, or would that approach be counterproductive?

NATO's Future Russia's invasion of Ukraine brought extensive debate about NATO's possible role in helping to resolve the conflict. Should NATO provide expedited membership to countries such as Ukraine and Norway? If so, how can NATO proceed without provoking Russia?

Understanding Indonesia Indonesia is one of the world's largest democracies and the world's largest Muslim-majority nation. Why do most Americans know so little about it?

High Seas Treaty In September 2023 the U.S. signed on to the High Seas Treaty, also known as the Biodiversity Beyond National Jurisdiction Treaty. Its purpose is to develop protective measures for the high seas. What is it, why is it necessary, and how can nations be convinced to sign on and honor its provisions?

Pandemic Preparedness What did we learn from the COVID-19 pandemic? How can we handle future global health challenges more effectively?

One of its unique features is that, while it is led by professionals, undergraduates serve as facilitators and role-models in a girlsenvironment. Our Scholarships

AAUW Star Bright Scholarship

The AAUW Star Bright Memorial Scholarship was established in 2005 by Book Club 3. It provides branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College.

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Awards: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards two \$300 prizes based on those projects submitted to the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair: The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science & Engineering Fair Award goes to a top female entrant; The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science & Engineering Fair Emerging Research Scholar Award goes to a female entrant whose skills are laudable, but still developing.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW STEM Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co Branch for two years. It is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair.

Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS): This hands-on program is dedicated to science education for regional middle school girls by enthusiastic professionals and

undergraduates as facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship:

Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student aged 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.
