MENTAL HEALTH IN THE CLASSROOM

Diane Kratt has been part of FGCU's College of Education faculty since 2008. Prior to that, she was a K-12 educator for twenty years. She enjoys working with student teachers, supervisors, and classroom teachers to develop effective educators for the future. Some of her favorite topics include child development, gifted education, classroom management, study abroad, and school mental health. Currently, Diane is a member of American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE), National Association of Professional Development Schools (NAPDS), and Mental Health Education Integration Consortium (MHEDIC).She holds an Ed.D degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Florida Gulf Coast University.

Dr.Kratt's research focuses primarily on school mental health. She is especially interested in the teacher's role regarding the mental health of the students and self. Since she joined the faculty, her goal has been to better prepare our pre-service teachers for today's classrooms regarding mental health. She started off by creating an annual community Children's Mental Health Conference that went on for ten years. Since then, she has brought the education and training directly to our students at various points throughout their programs.

In her own words, Diane summarizes: "...mental health has been a barrier to learning for a long time. Teachers are in a pivotal position regarding children/youth mental health, especially in identifying and making appropriate connections. Teacher preparation programs, however, typically have not offered mental health content as part of their curriculum. For over 10 years now, Florida Gulf Coast University's College of Education has been responsive to this need and worked to improve the mental health literacy of its teacher candidates. In this upcoming presentation I will share what that ten year journey has looked like and talk about where we might go from here."

Woman of Interest

Golda Meir was an Israeli politician who served as the fourth prime minister of Israel from 1969 to 1974. She was Israel's first and only female head of government, the first female head of government in the Middle East, and the fourth elected female head of government or state in the world.

Born in Kiev in the Russian Empire (now Ukraine) to Jewish parents, Meir immigrated as a child with her family to the United States in 1906. She graduated from the Milwaukee, WI Normal School and found work as a teacher. While in Milwaukee, she embraced the Labor Zionist movement.

In 1921, she and her husband emigrated to Palestine, an area set up by the League of Nations, later becoming the kibbutz's representative.

Meir held several key roles in the Jewish Agency during and after World War II. She was a signatory of the Israeli Declaration of Independence in 1948 Meir was elected to the Knesset in 1949. In 1969, Meir assumed the role of prime minister. Early in her tenure, she made multiple diplomatic visits with western leaders to promote her vision of peace in the region. גולדה מאיר

A controversial figure in Israel, Meir has been lionized as a founder of the state and described as the "Iron Lady" of Israeli politics.


Mail-In Ballots DID YOU KNOW?


All mail-in ballot requests <u>expired at the end of 2022</u>. This has nothing to do with your voter registration. If you were registered to vote in FL/Lee County prior to 12/31/22, you are still registered to vote. However, <u>you must reapply for mail-in ballots</u>.

This is easy to do at **https://www.lee.vote** (If you do not live in Lee County, go to the appropriate website.) Scroll down the home page to find the link to accomplish this. If your address has changed, you must correct that with the election's office. Mail-in ballots cannot be forwarded.

The new requests will expire at the end of 2024.







GREAT DECISIONS

Great Decisions is America's largest discussion program on world affairs. The program model involves reading the Great Decisions *Briefing Book*, watching the documentary film series and meeting in a discussion group to discuss the most critical global issues facing America today. Great Decisions meets virtually on the first Friday of every month (usually with a couple of alterations due to holidays) from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. There are eight topics each year; our branch meets February through June and September through November. Participants purchase a booklet published by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA) to prepare for the discussions and watch a "Master Class" video on the topic. FPA suggests additional readings for each topic, but that reading is at the discussions. Costs for the booklet and shipping/handling have not yet been announced. However, in previous years the cost of the booklet has been \$35. Go to fpa.org for more information about Great Decisions. Below is a summary from the first Discussion Group for this fall.

AAUW Great Decisions Discussion Group October 6, 2023 "Iran at a Crossroads" Discussion leader Mary Lou Chamberlain

"Iran at the Crossroads" from the 2023 Edition of the book Great Decisions Foreign Policy Association, which was written by Lawrence G. Potter, contained so much information. Mr. Potter teaches at the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University. Mr. Potter also was deputy director of Gulf 2000, a major research and documentation project on the Persian states based there, from 1994 to 2016 to name a few of his accomplishments.

Mr. Potter begins his article by talking about the uprising in Iran because of the arrest and killing of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini, who was charged with "bad hijab" on September 15,2022. This brought about protests in some 100 cities. The slogan of the revolt was "Woman, Life, Freedom." This level of defiance and anger had not been seen before. Iran did kill 300 people and over 14,000 people had been arrested. The Iranian government pardoned 22,000 Iranians.

Iran talks about the United States as their enemy. Iran also blames many of their problems on the United States, although this is unfounded.

Our discussion group felt it was important for the United States to try to reconcile with Iran. Foremost is to try to deal with the nuclear treaty that President Trump pulled out of with Iran. The Obama Administration led by John F. Kerry, Secretary of State, focused on Iran and achieved their single foreign policy victory. The partners in the treaty included Britain, France, Germany, Russian, and China and was signed July 2015. The Trump administration repeatedly said that they wanted to negotiate a "better deal" with Iran but failed to do so.

So far attempts by the U.S. to isolate and punish Iran have hurt the Iranian people but not led to policy changes by the Iranian government. We believe it's time to alter its policy.

We noted that the population of Iran is young. Sixty percent are below the age of 30. The average age of marriage for males is 27.8 years, while for females it is 23.1. The population surged from 36 million in 1978 to 88.6 million by mid-2022. We also noted that there are not many Americans who are experts in Iranian culture and history. People who had experience have retired.

In October, we highlighted one of our STEM scholarships. *(STEM is an acronym for science, technology, engineering, and math. These four fields share an emphasis on innovation, problem-solving, and critical thinking.)* GEMS (Girls in Engineering, Math, and Science) is a hands-on science education program for regional middle school girls. One of its unique features is that, while it is led by professionals and undergraduates serve as facilitators and role-models in a girls-only environment.

On Saturday, September 30, ninety-three students from the area middle schools converged on the FGCU campus for the first GEMS (Girls in Engineering, Math & Science) Program of this academic year. The students were split into two groups and had a chance to explore two areas of study. One group explored ways to protect a water balloon from a drop from a balcony. The students had a variety of materials to choose from to complete their projects.

Later, the groups switched rooms and did the other's projects. What a great day for this group of Middle School students! The next GEMS program will be held on Dec 2nd at the Whitaker Center on the FGCU campus. It was wonderful to be able to meet in person!!

Later, they took the projects to a balcony and did the drop. It was great that the students worked together to make a project that was fun and informative. Meanwhile, the second group of students looked at microbes that are found in our foods. This was a hands-on experience that

showed how Microbiology is important to food safety, production, processing, preservation, and storage.to auction for the event. Guidelines and ideas appear on page 8 in the Torch. AAUW Star Bright Scholarship

The AAUW Star Bright Memorial Scholarship was established in 2005 by Book Club 3. It provides branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. As funds accrue, a \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a female student attending the second semester at Fort Myers or Cape Coral Technical College. **AAUW Lee County High School Scholarship:** Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. It awards one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a graduating female student with financial need chosen by the school counselor. The award is paid to the college of the recipient's choice.

AAUW STEM Awards: Established in 2001 to encourage middle and high school girls in STEM fields. It awards two \$300 prizes based on those projects submitted to the Thomas Alva Edison & Regional Science Kiwanis and Engineering Fair: The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science & Engineering Fair Award goes to a top female entrant; The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science & Engineering Fair Emerging Research Scholar Award goes to a female entrant whose skills are laudable, but still developing.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW STEM Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co Branch for two years. It is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair *Girls in Engineering, Math and Science (GEMS):* This hands-on program is dedicated to science education for regional middle school girls by enthusiastic professionals and undergraduates as facilitators and role models in a girls-only environment.

AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one scholarship to a female student who resides in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area with financial need pursuing an undergraduate degree at FGCU. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student aged 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority is given to the current awardee.

AAUW FSW State College Endowed Scholarship: Established in 2000, with member and matching funds from the state, it awards one \$1,000 scholarship to a female Lee County student with financial need attending the Fort Myers Campus of FSW. Priority is given to the current awardee.

PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW FORT MYERS/LEE COUNTY Submitted by Suzan Harden skh062653@gmail.com November Public Policy Update

Florida Public Policy Chairs met virtually Tuesday, October 24. A highlight of the meeting was for the PPC's to share what is happening in their branches. Here are some highlights:

St. Augustine is working with the League of Women Voters to write post cards to felons who will likely be eligible to vote in 2024 elections to encourage them to register and vote. They are also making presentations to community groups regarding human trafficking, an area of particular concern to that branch.

The Sarasota branch is preparing for a meeting with their state representative where they will outline the branch's education priorities.

The Weston branch is working to circulate the petitions gathering signatures to get issues regarding Clean Water and Women's Reproductive Rights on the ballot in 2024.

All the chairs are working to identify proposed bills that may be relevant to AAUW FL's Public Policy initiatives.

Upcoming FL AAUW Public Policy Issue Virtual Forums

Petition to Place Reproductive Freedom Initiative on 2024 FL Ballot

AAUW FL supports the efforts of Floridians Protecting Freedom (https://floridiansprotectingfreedom.com/) to put an amendment on the 2024 ballot that, if passed, will guarantee Florida women the right to make their own decisions about their health care with the support and assistance of their friends, families, and doctors. Volunteers are out and about Lee County talking with voters and collecting signatures. For this measure you must be registered to vote in Florida. You can sign the petition only once. Also, once you have signed, your signature of support is public record. Here is a link to the petition:

VOTING IN 2024

Under Florida law, all mail-in ballot requests were canceled at the end of 2022. This does not affect your voter registration. If you have not already done so, Florida officials encourage you to renew your mail-in ballot request as soon as possible. If your permanent address is in Lee County, go to <u>www.lee.vote</u> to request a new mail-in ballot or to verify that your request is active. The link is on the home page. If your permanent address is out of county/state, check your local guidelines to be sure your mail-in ballot request is still valid. Your new FL ballot request will be effective until the end of December, 2024.

Mail-in ballots cannot be forwarded. If you are in a temporary residence because of Hurricane Ian, contact the Lee County Elections Office to ensure your eligibility to vote in 2024.
