This opportunity does not change any of our normal donation processes. All opportunities for donating will remain the same, and this is just an *additional way* to contribute to our scholarships and an *additional way* to honor someone. The normal channels will still be available.

We want to **THANK YOU** for your incredible generosity. Because of that generosity, we can increase our support for several of our established scholarships and fund some exciting additions to our STEM awards.

AAUW **FGCU** and **FSW** Endowed Scholarships: These scholarships were established in 2000. They award scholarships to female students who reside in the five-county (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) area, with financial need, pursuing undergraduate degrees at FGCU and FSW respectively. The amount awarded is a percentage of the endowments and is approximately \$2,000.

AAUW Star Bright Scholarships: Originally established in 2005, by Book Club 3, to provide branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. There are now two Star Bright Scholarships, and they are a budgeted item that awards scholarships to female students attending the second semester at Cape Coral Technical College and Fort Myers Technical College.

We were able to increase the funding of these life-changing scholarships to \$2,000 each.

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarships: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. Two scholarships are awarded to graduating

female students (from two different schools) with financial need. The scholars are chosen by the schools' counselors and the scholarships are paid to the colleges of the recipients' choice. We were able to raise these awards to \$2,000 each.

AAUW STEM Awards (High-School): Established in 2001 to encourage high school girls in STEM fields, it awards two entrants in the Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. Recipients must present a unique, quality topic, and conduct their own research. Judging is done by members of the Scholarship Committee. The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science & Engineering Fair Award and Emerging Research Scholar Award will now each provide a \$500 prize.

AAUW STEM Awards (Middle-School): Many of you know that girls often lose interest in STEM in middle-school, so this is an important time to support that interest. As you know we contribute annually to Girls in Engineering, Math, and Science (GEMS) program. Past Torch articles have highlighted this hands-on program dedicated to science education for regional middle-school students. The day-long programs, in a girls-only environment, are presented by enthusiastic professionals with undergraduates participating as facilitators and role models. This year we can increase the amount of our contribution to \$1,500. In addition, for this year, we are going to be able to support young women's interest in STEM by providing awards to middle-school girls participating in the Junior Division of Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair. There will be three Regional Inventors Fair. There will be three \$200 awards—one each in grades six, seven and eight.

PayPal is a payment platform with a website and a phone app that enables payments between parties through online money transfers.


Why does the Fort Myers/Lee County Branch, Inc. have an account?

Elizabeth Magie

HISTORIC HURRICANES OF FORT MYERS


Thomas P. Hall is an art journalist, arts advocate and local historian. He has authored three books, Epic Fires of Fort Myers: How a Series of Early Fires Influenced the Town's Development, Volumes I & II, and Female Pioneers of Fort Myers: Women Who Influenced the Town's Development, which he co-authored with Florida author Robin Tuthill, along with a Guidebook for the Buck's Backyard Mural at McCollum Hall in the Dunbar Community of Fort Myers. As the City of Fort Myers Public Art Consultant, Tom advises the City regarding the administration, expansion and promotion of its art collection, and is responsible for placing narrative and audio recordings on a free phone app known as Otocast which inform users of the stories the City's public artworks tell about Fort Myers' early history and cultural heritage. As the voice of WGCU's Spotlight on the Arts, Tom's weekly segment for the local NPR affiliate (90.1 FM) highlights plays, musicals, art exhibitions and cultural events taking place in Southwest Florida from Marco Island to Sarasota

Learn about three 19th century hurricanes.

Upcoming Elections

Tuesday, November 5 – General Election Deadline to Register – October 7

Deadline to Request that Ballot be Mailed - October 24

- If you have updated your request that your **Vote-by-Mail Ballots** be mailed to you since Dec. 31, 2022, your request is valid until the end of this year. You do not need to do it again.
- Vote-by-Mail Ballots will not be forwarded by the U.S. Postal Service. If you need your ballot forwarded to a different address than that on your voter registration record, you must contact the Supervisor of Elections.
- If your signature has changed considerably (illness, accident), contact the Supervisor of Elections to get your new signature on record.
- To assure timely delivery, the Supervisor of Elections recommends you mail your Vote-by-Mail ballot 10 days prior to the election. The mail ballot must reach the elections office by 7 p.m. November 5.

Summary of AAUW FL September Public Policy Forum

The first Public Policy Forum of the new program year was held Thursday, September 5. The topics were Amendment 1 and a brief summary of 2024 FL legislation regarding education. AAUW FL's Public Policy Co-Director Mary Gatta and LWVFL's Rosemary Nilles and Nancy Chism were the presenters.

Amendment 1 – Partisan vs Nonpartisan School Board Elections

Florida's school board elections have been nonpartisan since 1998. If approved by at least 60 percent of voters, school board elections would become part of Florida's closed primary system as of the November 2026 General Election. Primaries leading to this election may be partisan.

In the current system, school board candidates do not declare a party. Candidates are arranged on the ballot by district, alphabetically. Lee County has seven districts: 5 districts are area-specific; 2 districts are county-wide or open seats. All registered voters can vote for school board seats. The winning candidate must receive 50 percent of the vote plus one. If no candidate wins 50 percent, the top two candidates appear in a run-off.

How would this amendment change school board elections?

- 1. In a closed primary, only voters registered to a particular party can vote for that party's candidates.
- 2. Approximately 30 percent of Florida voters are registered as No Party Affiliates (NPAs), roughly 4 million voters. NPAs cannot vote in a closed primary; therefore, all those voters would now be excluded from voting in school board primaries. In Lee County, 128,848 voters, or 26.8 percent, are registered as NPAs and would be excluded in future primaries.
- 3. If only one party has candidates, the primary is open to all voters. Such a primary is called a Universal Primary Contest (UPC).
- 4. But Florida has a write-in loophole to close a UPC. The write-in candidate runs only in the general election and does not specify a party affiliation. Often, the candidate does not even campaign. However, the write-in candidate closes the primary. As a result of this loophole, over 8 million Florida voters were excluded from voting in Florida primaries from 1998-2022.

Reasons to Vote No on Amendment 1

All registered voters will participate in primary elections

Nonpartisan boards may have more incentive for collaboration and compromise

Nonpartisan elections maintain local control

Nonpartisanship promotes a school community with diverse perspectives and experiences

Reasons to Vote Yes on Amendment 1

Partisan school boards may contribute to transparency

Partisan school boards are a logical outgrowth of the politicization of education

Partisan school boards will align with other partisan races such as commissioners and sheriffs.

Did you know? A new law passed in 2023 permits candidates from outside our county to run for our local school board. Only after being elected would they have to move to our county.

Brief Summary of Education Bills Passed During 2024 Legislative Session

Governor DeSantis signed into law 28 bills passed in the 2024 Legislative Session dealing with Education. Some had many topics. These are just highlights.

CS/HB 1317 – Patriotic Organizations. Allows Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America; Boy Scouts of America; Boys & Girls Clubs of America; Civil Air Patrol; Future Farmers of America; Girl Scouts of the United States of America; Naval Sea Cadets; Little League Incorporated; and Marine League Corp to speak with and distribute informational materials in classes to encourage participation and inform students of benefits to the student and the community. May have tables and recruit in schools.

CS/HB 1291 – Teacher preparation programs. Program may not distort significant historical events, teach identify politics, violate Florida law regarding discrimination, or base coursework or instruction on specified theories regarding social, political, and economic inequities. Covers incentives and easing of standards to encourage entry.

CS/CS/HB 1285 – Classical school teacher certification. The State Board of Ed can set standards. General, content or professional knowledge not required. Good only at a classical school. A classical school implements a classical education school model that emphasizes the development of students in the principles of moral character and civic virtue through a well-rounded education in the liberal arts and sciences that is based on the classical trivium states of grammar, logic, and rhetoric. Florida has 18 classical charter schools across 9 school districts. CS/CS/HB 49 – Employment of Minors. You heard a lot about this bill last spring because AAUW FL opposed its passage. This bill 1) permits minors 16 and 17 years old to work for more than 8 hours in any one day when school is not scheduled the following day and the day of work is a holiday or a Sunday; 2) waives the cap of 30 hours per week when school is in session for minors 16 and 17 years old if approved by minor's parent or custodian or by the school superintendent or designee; 3) allows minors 16 and 17 years old to work more than 6 consecutive days in any one week.

CS/CS/HB 1285 – Limit on book challenges. A resident in the county who is not the parent or guardian of a student with access to school district materials may object to no more than one material per month.

HB 931 – School Chaplains. Allows school districts and charter school governing boards to authorize volunteer school chaplains to provide supports, services, and programs, (i.e., mental health services) to children. Volunteer chaplains must meet background screening requirements just as any other school district employee or contractual entity must do. Districts must post on the school district website the names of the approved chaplains and their religious affiliations, identify the services the chaplains will be able to provide, and parents must give written permission for their children to receive services. Most school districts in the state, including Lee, have not embraced this policy.

Other Amendments of Interest

<u>Amendment 2 – Right to Fish and Hunt</u>

Right to Fish and Hunt - Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to preserve forever fishing and hunting, including by the use of traditional methods, as a public right and preferred means of responsibly managing and controlling fish and wildlife. Specifies that the amendment does not limit the authority granted to the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission under Section 9 of Article IV of the State Constitution.

<u>Amendment 3 – Adult Personal Use of Marijuana</u>

Adult Personal Use of Marijuana - Allows adults 21 years or older to possess, purchase, or use marijuana products and marijuana accessories for non-medical personal consumption by smoking, ingestion, or otherwise; allows Medica Marijuana Treatment Centers, and other state licensed entities, to acquire, cultivate, process, manufacture, sell, and distribute such products and accessories. Applies to Florida law; does not change, or immunize violations of, federal law. Establishes possession limits for personal use. Allows consistent legislation. Defines terms. Provides effective date.

<u>Amendment 4 – Abortion Access</u>

Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion: No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider. This amendment does not change the Legislature's constitutional authority to require notification to a parent or guardian before a minor has an abortion.

<u>Amendment 5 – Homestead Annual Inflation Adjustment</u>

Annual adjustment to Homestead Exemption Value: Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to require an annual adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies and for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible. This amendment takes effect January 1, 2025.

Amendment 6 – Repeal of Public Campaign Financing Requirement

Repeal of Public Campaign Financing Requirement: Proposing the repeal of the provision in the State Constitution which requires public financing for campaigns of candidates for elective statewide office who agree to campaign spending limits.


