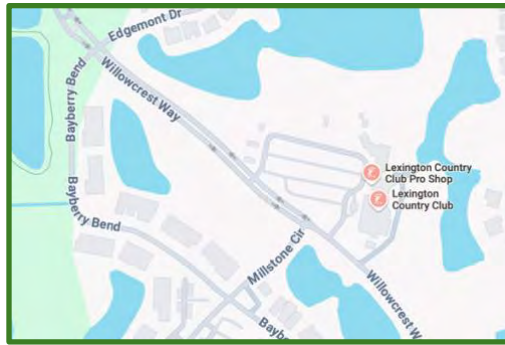

FEBRUARY SPEAKER:
FGCU's ROLE in the SWFL Region

Aysegul Timur, Ph.D., was selected to become Florida Gulf Coast University's fifth president on May 4, 2023, following a unanimous endorsement from the FGCU Board of Trustees. Her presidency was confirmed by the Florida Board of Governors on June 22, 2023. In her most recent role, Timur served as Vice President and Vice Provost for Strategy and Program Innovation at FGCU, where she has worked since 2019.



Dr. Timur received her doctoral degree in Business Administration, majoring in Economics, from the University of South Florida, and both her master's and bachelor's degrees in business administration from the University of Istanbul. Her areas of specialization include business policy and organizational development, quality control, statistics for strategic planning, health (especially pharmaceutical pricing), and international economics.

Dr. Timur is a go-to expert for workforce development and was recently honored by the Florida College Access Network as one of its first Workforce Education Innovators. Before joining the University team, she held a variety of faculty and executive leadership positions in higher education, including full professor of economics.

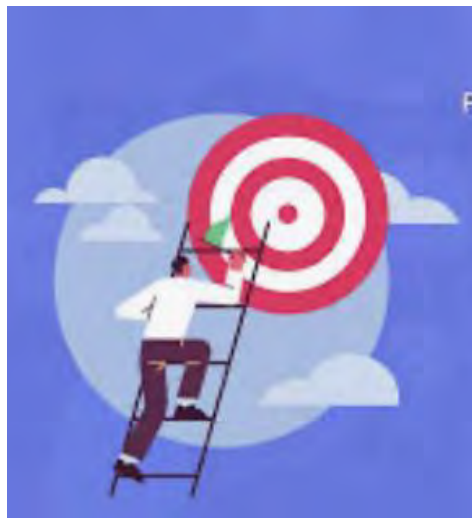

History of the STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

September 2021 -- AAUW Florida adopted a Strategic Plan from AAUW National to assist all branches in achieving the AAUW mission of advocating gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy.

April 2022 -- Our branch approved the Strategic Planning Committee as a standing committee co-chaired by Kathleen Haibach and Tamara Pigott. We are one of only three branches in Florida to have such a committee.

March 2023 -- The committee submitted a strategic plan, revised by Tam Pigott, that was approved by the board and presented to the membership. The committee is charged with reviewing and revising the strategic plan annually.

Key items of focus include:

- 1) Recruiting and retaining members
- 2) Providing members with avenues for active participation as well as receiving feedback
- 3) Collaborating with other branches and community organizations
- 4) Increasing and improving communication between the board and branch members via the TORCH, emails, and the website
- 5) Continued support and evaluation of scholarship endeavors

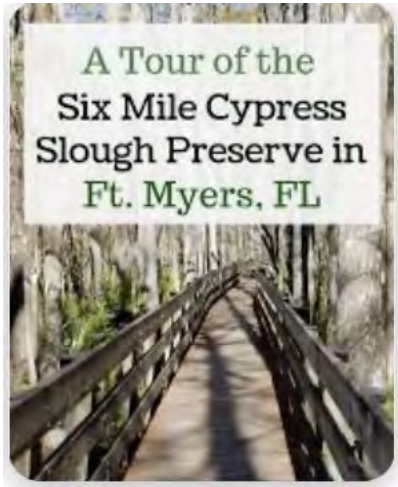

PUBLIC POLICY

The next AAUW-FL Public Policy Forum will be held on Thursday, February 13, at 6 p.m. Pat DeWitt, co-chair of the AAUW-FL Public Policy Committee, will conduct the 2025 Florida Legislative Preview. The Florida Public Policy Committee is reviewing the bills proposed for the 2025 Florida Legislative Session, looking for those that could have an impact on AAUW's mission. In addition, strategies for advocating with our elected officials will be provided. Anyone is welcome to attend this meeting. There is no cost, but you do need to make a reservation.

The most recent Public Policy Forum was held on January 9. Bayliss Fiddiman, a civil rights attorney working with the National Women's Law Center, presented the results of a study of discipline issues affecting Black girls in the Miami-Dade School District. The Southern Poverty Law Center requested the study after receiving complaints about the district. Students interviewed ranged in age from 12 – 24, as researchers wanted input from students who were previously enrolled in the district as well as current students. The district declined to provide demographic information about its school safety/security staff. Here are some of the findings:

- Girls reported discomfort with the bathroom monitoring procedures in place, especially with male security personnel escorting them to the restrooms.
- The girls believed that Black girls were more likely to be cited for dress code violations than other girls in the school.
- The girls reported that smaller, thinner girls wearing similar clothing as those cited were not cited for dress code violations.
- Students reported body-shaming comments from both male and female security staff members and inappropriate comments from both genders about their appearance in general.
- Students did not feel confident that reports of sexual harassment or bullying were taken seriously or that attempts were made to resolve them.
- From comments made by students, researchers believe there is an “adultification” of Black girls that does not occur with students of other races or ethnicities.
- A general conclusion drawn was that the students believed school security personnel needed more and better training in investigating sexual assault and bullying.
- Students reported not feeling comfortable talking about personal issues with security staff.

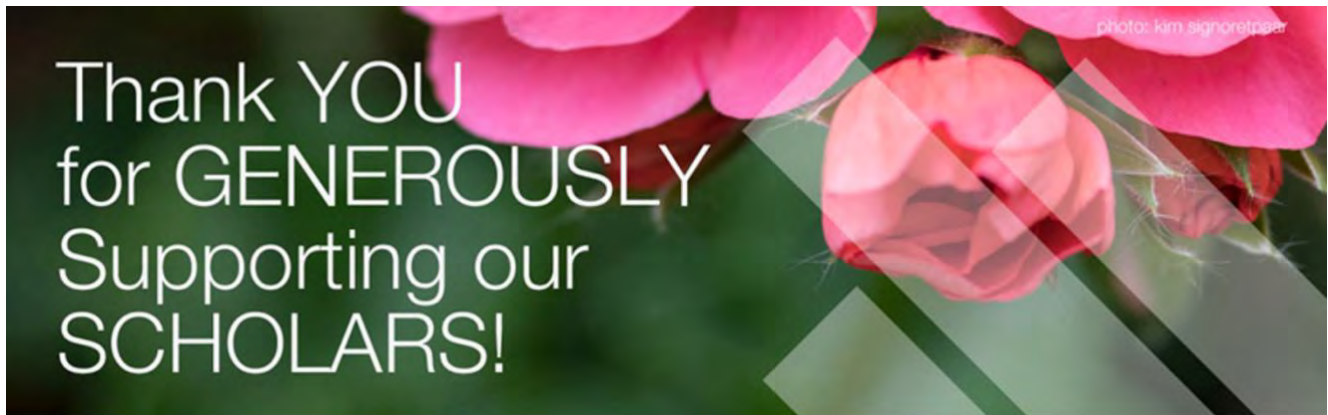

In this column we want to thank you for your incredible generosity. Your donations and support of our Bingo Gala have enabled us to increase our support for several of our established scholarships and fund some exciting additions to our STEM awards. This is something we have always dreamed of being able to do, and we cannot thank you enough on behalf of the young women whose aspirations and dreams you are supporting. The specific details are described at the end of the column and the changes are highlighted in red.

We want to send a special **THANK YOU** to the generosity of: Jill Berle, Nancy Paterson, Mary Lou Chamberlain, Jodi Harrison, Lisa Crotty, Carol Fuechsel, Judi Dixon, Judy Sims, Bonnie Ryan's brother (we don't have his name, but didn't want to leave him out), and Lynn and Jerome Kaminski.

We are concerned that there is confusion among some of our members about how our funds are structured, and we want to make sure everyone is comfortable with how our branch's money is handled.

We have two types of funds: *Unrestricted* and *restricted*. When you donate, you check a box to indicate how you want that donation to be used. Unrestricted monies can be used to support any of the needs of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Country Branch. Restricted monies can only be used for supporting our scholarships. Most of our money is restricted.

Within the *restricted* category, we also have two types of funds: *Endowed* scholarships are designed to be permanent and, when completely funded, self-sustaining. Funds are invested in a diversified portfolio, and scholarships are awarded based on the performance of those investments. These funds are, as is the norm, managed by a University or Community organization. We contribute to them annually.

We have three *endowed* scholarships,

- 1) AAUW FGCU Endowed Scholarship
- 2) FSW Endowed Scholarships
- 3) AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed Scholarship.

The remainder of our scholarships are *funded* by your donations and our fund-raising efforts.

Some updates:

- February 1 is the *Thomas Alva Edison & Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair*; where your Scholarship Committee will select two high school women for \$500 awards.
- February 1 is also the *Junior Division of Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair*, where we will be selecting three middle school girls (one sixth grade, one seventh grade, and one eighth grade) for \$200 awards. In addition, one middle school student will be chosen for The Marie Glasgow and AAUW Friends STEM Award.
- February 3 is the Inventor's Fair Awards Night. Devera Graf and her husband Fred (who some of you will remember for all

his help at previous Bingo galas) and Ron Glasgow will attend to present the winners with their Award Packets.

- February 4 is the Science Fair Awards Night. Devera and Fred, and Ron Glasgow will attend to present the winners with their Award Packets.
- Our two high schools for this year's AAUW Lee County High School Scholarships are South Fort Myers High School and the Ida S. Baker High School. Next month, we will visit the awardees at their schools to inform them of the awards.
- Our branch Awards Luncheon will be held on April 12, so that you can meet the girls and congratulate them on their achievements.

AAUW Star Bright Scholarships: Originally established in 2005, by Book Club 3, to provide branch members with the opportunity to make donations honoring friends and commemorating special events. There are now two Star Bright Scholarships, and they are a budgeted items that awards scholarships to female students attending the second semester at Cape Coral Technical College and Fort Myers Technical College. **We were able to increase funding these life-changing scholarships to \$2,000 each.**

AAUW Lee County High School Scholarships: Established in 2011 in memory of Jane Wagner, a three-term branch president. Two scholarships are awarded to graduating female students with financial need (from two different schools). The scholars are chosen by the schools' counselors, and the scholarships are paid to the colleges of the recipients' choice. **We were able to raise these awards to \$2,000 each.**

AAUW STEM Awards (High-School): Established in 2001 to encourage high school girls in STEM fields, it awards two entrants in the Thomas Alva Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science and Engineering Fair. Recipients must present a unique, quality topic, and conduct their own research. Judging is done by members of the Scholarship Committee. **The AAUW Thomas Edison and Kiwanis Regional Science**

& Engineering Fair Award and Emerging Research Scholar Award will now each provide a \$500 prize.

AAUW STEM Awards (Middle-School): Many of you know that girls often lose interest in STEM in middle-school, so this is an important time to support that interest. We contribute annually to the **Girls in Engineering, Math, and Science (GEMS)** program. Past *Torch* articles have highlighted this hands-on program dedicated to science education for regional middle-school students. The day-long programs, in a girls-only environment, are presented by enthusiastic professionals with undergraduates participating as facilitators and role models. **This year we can increase the amount of our contribution to \$1,500. In addition, for this year, we are going to be able to support young women's interest in STEM by providing awards to middle-school girls participating in the Junior Division of Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair. There will be three \$200 awards—one each in grades six, seven and eight.**

Our remaining scholarships will be funded at their budgeted levels:

AAUW FGCU and FSW Endowed

Scholarships: These scholarships were established in 2000. They award scholarships to female students who reside in the five-county area (Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Glades, Hendry) with financial need, pursuing undergraduate degrees at FGCU and FSW respectively. The amount awarded is a percentage of the endowments and is approximately \$2,000.

AAUW Sue Gottcent Memorial Endowed

Scholarship: Established in 2006 with a bequest from the estate of member Sue Gottcent, who was an avid supporter of AAUW's mission. It awards one \$2,000 scholarship to a Lee County female student aged 25 or older with demonstrated financial need who attends an institute of higher education that is part of the Florida State University system. Priority is given to the current awardee.

Marie Glasgow and AAUW Friends STEM

Award Fund: Established in 2019 in honor of Marie Glasgow, who was president of AAUW Fort Myers/Lee Co. Branch for two terms, \$500

is awarded each year with the goal of improving educational opportunities by rewarding young Middle School girl(s) who are winners at the Junior Division of Edison-Kiwanis Science Fair or Thomas Edison Festival of Light Regional Inventors Fair. In even numbered years, the award will go to a Lee County Middle School girl (grades 6-8) participating in the Junior Division of the Edison-Kiwanis **Regional Science Fair**. The winner should demonstrate meritorious effort but **not a be major winner** (possibly third or fourth place.) The project must be STEM related and show proof of her own research. In odd numbered years the award will go to a Lee County Middle School girl (grades 6-8), participating in the Thomas Edison Festival of

Light **Regional Inventor’s Fair**. The winner should show meritorious effort but is **not a major winner** (possibly third or fourth place.). **The projects could benefit Mankind or the Environment**. Judging for both awards is done by the Special Award Staff. The Award Judges may suggest different selection criteria but must seek approval of the donor prior to award disbursement.
